
This term students will be presented with their Premier Reading Challenge certificates.



School Student Travel

Term 4 2023

2024 school travel applications are now open

Students who need a new or replacement School Opal card or travel pass for 2024 can <u>apply</u> now. A new application will need to be submitted if they are applying for the first time, or if they are requesting an additional travel entitlement because of a new shared parental arrangement (e.g. joint custody).

Students who change address, school, campus location, have repeated a year or received an expiry notification for their school travel entitlement should <u>renew or update</u> their details <u>before</u> the end of term 4. This will ensure that schools can endorse applications, and travel passes remain valid for the start of the 2024 school year. School Opal card holders will have the changes applied to their existing card.

If a student's distance eligibility has changed based on their grade (i.e. grade two to grade three), the system will automatically update their entitlement if they meet the new criteria. If they do not meet the new eligibility criteria, we will send an expiry notification via email.

Students who have an entitlement approved under a medical condition that is due to expire will receive a notification advising them to re-apply.

Term Bus Pass holders will receive a notification to re-apply.

Students in the Opal network applying for an Opal card (including a Term Bus Pass) for the first time will receive their Student Opal card at their nominated postal address. Cards will be mailed out from January 2024.

Students living in rural and regional (R&R) areas should receive their travel pass at the start of the new school year from their nominated transport operator. It may come via the school or be sent directly to them at home. **Note**: some R&R operators do not issue travel passes.

Students/parents should confirm with their nominated operator if they do not receive a pass.

Changes to your bus service provider

Within Greater Sydney, a number of bus service providers have changed their names.

Parents intending to lodge an application for a School Opal card will need to visit <u>transportnsw.info</u> <u>trip</u> <u>planner</u> to obtain the correct bus operator name servicing your area prior to lodging an application.

Travel from Term 1 2024

We ask that parents plan ahead and make sure their child knows which service/s to use and has a valid ticket to travel; either a School Opal card or Child/Youth Opal card (within Greater Sydney) or a School Travel Pass (outside Greater Sydney), from the start of the school year.

Applications for 2024 School Student Transport Scheme (SSTS) travel open at the start of Term 4 2023, so parents/students can apply or update details early and be ready for the start of the new school year.

Most students using the Opal network will not need a new Opal card and can continue travelling on their existing card each year.

The start of the year is a busy period for local transport operators, and students travelling without a valid ticket make service planning and operations difficult.

We recognise that for some families last minute changes to school enrolments mean they may not have a School Opal card or Travel Pass for the start of term. In the Opal network, we strongly encourage these families to have their children travel with a Child/Youth Opal card until they receive their valid School Opal card. If outside Greater Sydney, parents should contact their <u>local bus operator</u> to discuss their travel needs.

Bus operators are flexible and understanding, particularly at the start of the school year, and will ensure students can travel safely to and from school. But to best support our operators we encourage all students to have a valid ticket, as early as possible, from the start of the school year.

Students using School Opal cards are also reminded that they must tap on and tap off in line with the Student code of conduct and Opal terms of use.

A Guide to TikTok for Aussie Parents and Guardians



- ☑ Helping your teens manage their online activity is a really important role and one that can feel complicated if you're not familiar with our platform, or the tools that are available to help.
- ☑ To assist you, we've partnered with ySafe Australia's leading online safety educators to develop the Guardian's Guide, which provides a simple overview of TikTok and the many tools and controls we've built into the product to keep teens safe.



TikTok's Online Safety Tools

Family Pairing

Link your TikTok account to your teen's to help them manage screen time, privacy and more.

Private by Default

Users aged 13-15 have their accounts set to private by default, enabling teens to make informed choices about what they choose to share, when, and with

Age Restrictions

Direct messaging is only available to those aged 16+, and users must be 18+ to host a LIVE.

Screen Time Tools

Users under 18 automatically have daily screen time limits of 60-minutes. Once reached, they need to enter a passcode to continue watching, encouraging active decision making to extend that time.



How To Use Family Pairing

- 1. Download the TikTok app
- 2. Tap on "Profile", "Settings and Privacy", and scroll down to select "Family Pairing"
- Nominate whether you are the "parent" or "teen"
- Scan the QR code from your teen's profile to link accounts

You can now work with your teen to set daily limits for screen time, limit who can send messages to your teen, and manage their privacy settings together.

Strategies For Communicating With Teens

Here are a set of guidelines from our online safety partner, ySafe to help you communicate the importance of online safety with your teens. For more information, visit ySafe's online safety hub and TikTok.com/safety.

It starts with understanding the ABC's:

Manage Access

- Family Pairing allows parents and guardians to link their accounts with those of their teens and use a variety of privacy and safety tools, such as managing screen time limits, setting a teen's account to private, and deciding who can comment on their videos.
- Parents and guardians might also want to consider a device control to add an additional layer of protection for teens. These tools help you manage what and when teens can access certain platforms, filter inappropriate content both on the device and in-apps, and monitor activity to ensure safety is optimised.

Set Boundaries

- Setting boundaries for teens is all about understanding the importance of safe participation. Young people want and need to be allowed freedom and choice, but they also need to understand the confines those choices exist within.
- Setting boundaries might look like supporting your teen's use of a platform or tool, but helping them understand that it comes with responsibility. Implementing a digital device contract to create a sense of formality and responsibility regarding their online time might be appropriate.
- Or, creating rules and expectations on how they should behave, or what actions they should take when situations occur online that they know aren't right.

Openly Communicate

- Communication is about understanding each other's perspectives, and conveying your message in a way that resonates for the other person.
- Discussions about the online world need to happen early and occur often, and ensure that your teen knows that no matter what happens online, they can come to you for support and guidance.
- Starting a conversation with teens about the online world can be tricky. Try beginning with a simple question about what's on their For You Page, or who their favourite creator is.
- Seeing and understanding what your teen is enjoying online makes communication about safety on these platforms easier to manage.




